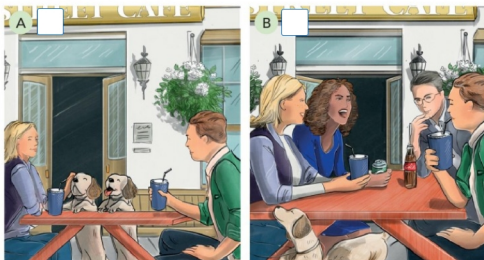

Contractions with question words

We can contract is after question words.

What's her name? = What is her name?

Where's he from? = Where is he from?

How's Anna? = How is Anna?

How old's Jan? = How old is Jan?

Don't contract is in a question when the last word is a pronoun (he, she, it, etc.).

How old is she? **NOT** How old's she?

Where is he? **NOT** Where's he?

Word stress

For most countries, the word stress is the same on the country and the nationality, e.g., *Brazil*, *Brazilian*.
Sometimes it's different:
Canada → *Canadian* *China* → *Chinese*
Japan → *Japanese* *Vietnam* → *Vietnamese*

Countries and languages

The word for a language is sometimes the same as the nationality.
England: nationality *English*, language *English*
Some are different, e.g.,
Canada: nationality *Canadian*, language *English*
Saudi Arabia: nationality *Saudi*, language *Arabic*
