green grass.




‘Look!’ says the little goat. ‘Look

'This is my bridge!' says the troll.



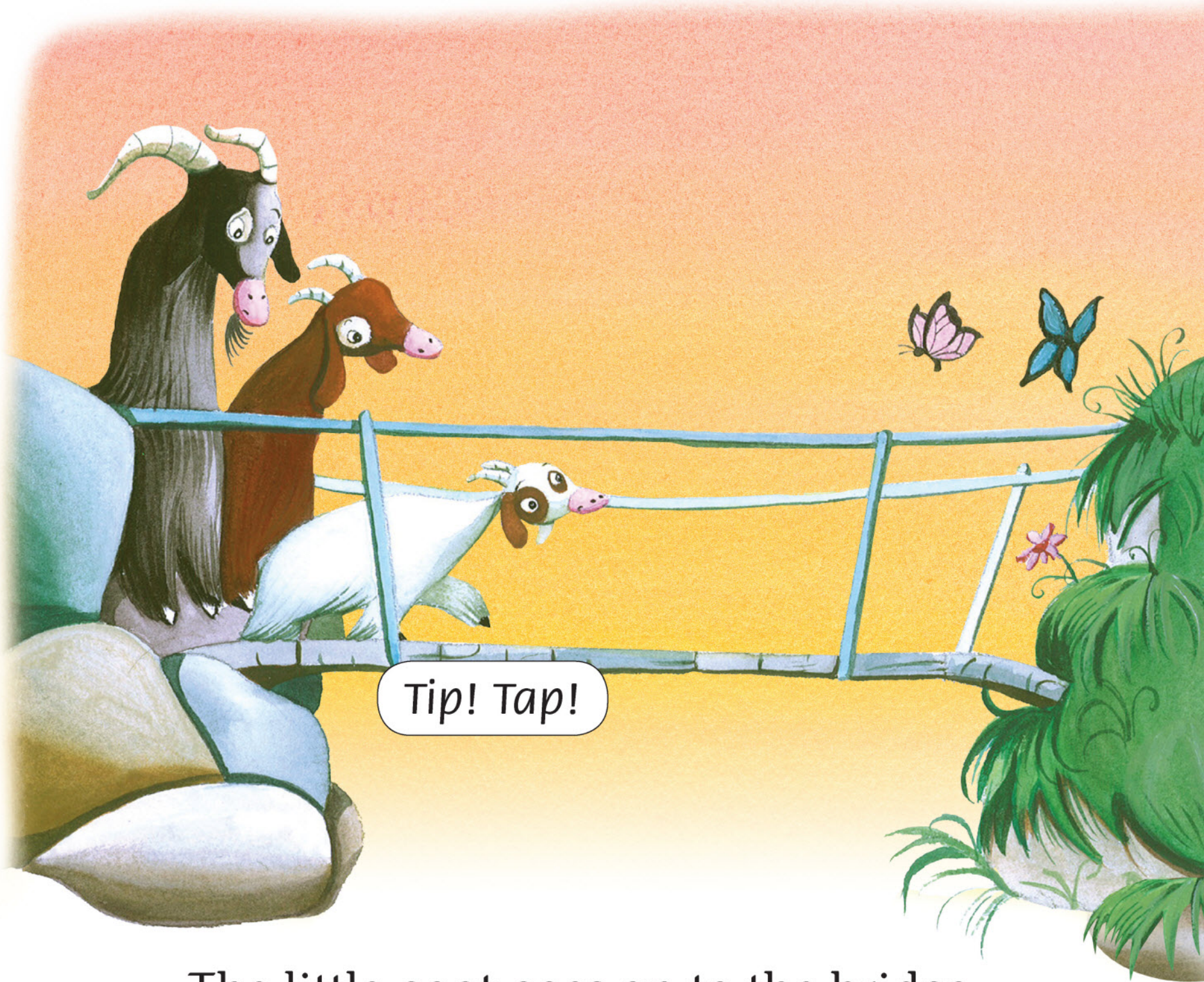

'I want to eat the grass.'

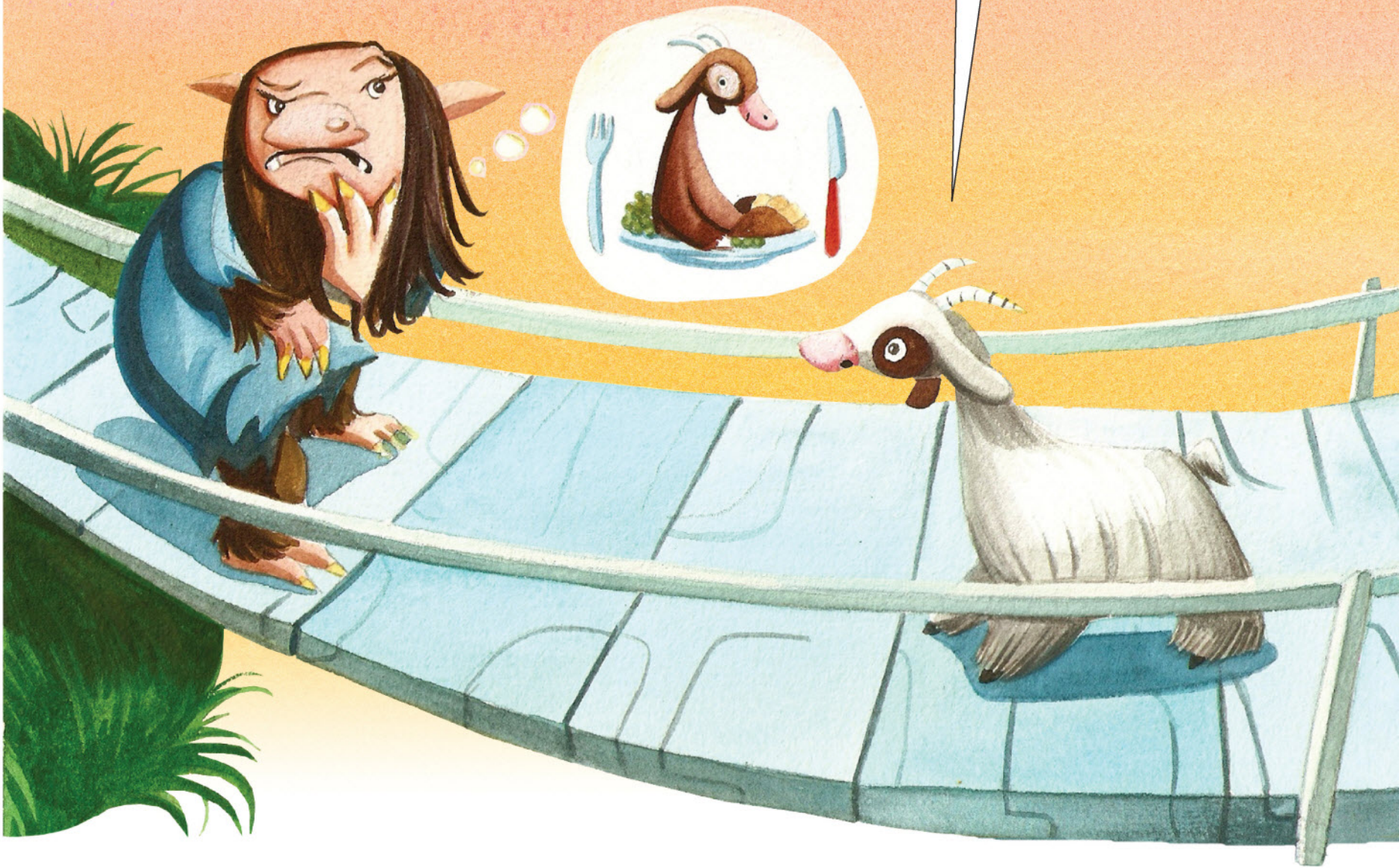
Who's on my bridge?

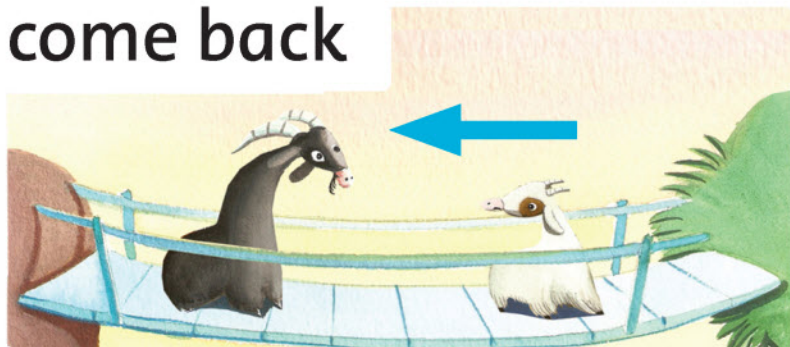

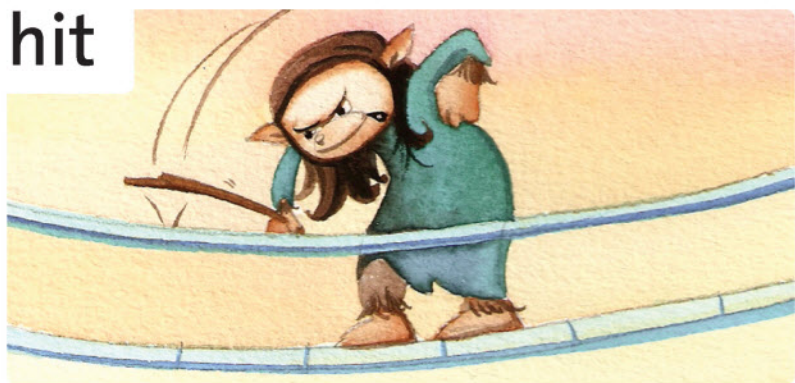
